

Case is advanced.

The natural guardian of petitioner and both side counsels present.

They have filed Joint memo along with I.A. U/O.32 Rule 7 r/w Sec.151 of CPC and annexed with certificate of counsel for petitioner.

The natural guardian of petitioner was admitted the fact that the compromise is agreed voluntarily. Counsel submitted it is beneficial to petitioner and amount will be utilized for the benefit of the petitioner.

They agreeing to settle the matter for **Rs.80,00,000/- (Rupees Eighty Lakh only)** as full and final settlement amount as per joint memo.

The identification of natural guardian of petitioner is verified by going through the original Aadhaar card and verifying the details of residence by asking orally.

Both the parties have signed the Joint memo.

The compromise is lawful and not oppose to public policy and it is beneficial to petitioner. Hence it can be accepted. As such I proceed to pass the following:

ORDER

The application filed U/O.32 Rule 7 r/w Sec.151 of CPC is hereby allowed.

The natural guardian of petitioner is permitted to enter into compromise on behalf of petitioner.

The petition is allowed in terms of Joint Memo filed by the parties.

The Joint memo shall form part and parcel of the award.

The **respondent No.2** is hereby directed to deposit the agreed amount

of **Rs.80,00,000/- (Rupees Eighty Lakh only)**.

Out of the deposit amount, office is directed to release **75%** compensation amount in favour of natural guardian of petitioner through E-payment on proper identification and to keep **25%** of compensation amount in FD for a term of 3 years in the name petitioner in any nationalized bank on proper identification.

The natural guardian of petitioner is at liberty to withdraw the periodical interest and shall utilize it for the development of petitioner.

Draw an award accordingly.
