

Both parties present and identified by their counsel.

Sri. TJM advocate filed IA No.7 U/O 32 rule 7 along with certificate seeking permission to compromise the suit on behalf of minor defendant No.6(c).

Heard and IA No.7 allowed and defendant No.6(a) permitted to compromise the suit on behalf of minor defendant No.6(c).

The plaintiff and defendants have filed joint compromise petition U/O.23 Rule-3 of CPC stating that they being the real brothers and sisters have compromised the case as per the advise of respectable persons of the village.

Perused the compromise petition, plaint and other documents of the case.

Defendant No.3 received Rs.3,00,000/-, Defendant No.5,8 and 9 received Rs.50,000/- each and on behalf of Defendant No.6(b) and 6(a) on her behalf and on behalf of minor Defendant No.6(c) received Rs.25,000/- jointly.

I have read-over and explained the contents of the compromise petition to the

plaintiff and defendants who are present before the court in the language best known to the parties and the same is admitted and accepted by the parties.

I am satisfied that there is no threat and coercion in this case for entering into compromise. Parties have voluntarily entered into the compromise. I found that the compromise is lawful. Hence, permission given to enter into compromise.

Accordingly following order is passed:-

ORDER

The compromise petition U/O.23 Rule-3 of CPC is hereby allowed and accepted.

Office is directed to draw compromise decree in terms compromise petition.

The compromise petition shall form part of the compromise decree.

In view of the compromise, the parties to bear their own costs.
