**ORDER ON COMPROMISE PETITION**  
**FILED BY THE BOTH PARTIES**  
**UNDER ORDER XXIII RULE 3 OF C.P.C.**

The plaintiff has filed the suit for the relief of  
declaration and permanent Injunction.

2. Counsel Sri. M.B. filed vakalath for the defendants.

3. The parties jointly filed compromise petition on  
above said provision. Plaintiff, defendants and their

counsels are present. The contents of compromise petition are read over to the plaintiff and defendants in the language known to them in the presence of their learned counsels. Both parties have agreed the contents of joint compromise petition as true. On enquiry the parties have submitted that there is no compulsion or force to arrive settlement of their dispute. I have carefully gone through the compromise petition. The parties have compromised or settled their dispute regarding plaint prayers. Hence it is an absolute compromise to the satisfaction of the Court that the suit has been adjusted wholly or the parties have settled their entire dispute mentioned in the plaint. As discussed above the parties have compromised entire subject matter of the suit with their satisfaction and said compromise is freely reported by the parties. On enquiry it appears that there is no compulsion, coercion or fraud on parties to reach compromise. Hence following:

**ORDER**

Compromise petition filed by the plaintiff  
and defendants under Order XXIII Rule 3

of C.P.C. is allowed. The suit of the plaintiff is compromised as per the terms of compromise petition and office is directed to draw decree accordingly. The office is directed to treat the compromise petition as part and parcel of the decree. Since the matter is ended in compromise, the office is directed to refund full Court fee to the plaintiff.

Draw decree accordingly.
