	24.06.2026	<u>JSR, J</u> This criminal petition has been filed by the petitioner/accused seeking to quash the proceedings in S.C.No.119 of 2024 on the file of the VI Additional District Judge, Ranga Reddy District at Kukatpally. Heard Mr.S.Srinivasulu, learned counsel for the petitioner and Mr.S.Deekshith Kumar Teja, learned counsel representing Mr.G.Praveen Kumar, learned counsel for respondent No.2. Learned counsel for the petitioner submitted that the petitioners and the victim are relatives. He further submitted that at the instance of elders and well wishers, respondent No.2 and the petitioners were entered into a compromise and respondent No.2/victim filed sworn affidavit, wherein at Para No.4 it is stated that she got married and had child and living peacefully. Therefore, she does not want to prosecute the proceedings. Learned counsel for the both parties submitted that the parties have filed a joint memo and sworn affidavit of respondent No.2 along with I.A.Nos.1 and 2 of 2026 seeking permission to compound the offences and to record the compromise respectively. When this Court raised a query as to whether, in heinous offences, the parties are entitled to seek recording of a compromise, learned counsel for the petitioner relied upon the principle laid down by the Hon'ble Apex Court in	Transferred to i/o folder, before corrections, if any

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		Madhukar and others vs. State of Maharashtra¹, wherein it was held that when the victim/<i>de-facto</i> complainant expresses that continuation of the prosecution would cause further disruption to her personal life and that she does not wish to support the charges or pursue the matter further, this Court has the power to record the compromise and to compound the offences. In view of the above said submissions made by the respective parties, the petitioner and respondent No.2/<i>de-facto</i> complainant are directed to appear before the High Court Legal Services Committee for identification, along with their identity cards, on or before 04.07.2026. Taking into consideration the submissions of learned counsel for the respective parties, the Registry is directed to transmit the case file to the High Court Legal Services Committee immediately. The High Court Legal Services Committee shall in turn submit the report before this Court on or before 08.07.2026. Post on 08.07.2026 under the caption ‘for compromise’. This order shall not be treated as a precedent in any other case. _____ JSR, J vsl
