- 01.** 1. Heard learned counsel for the Petitioners and learned counsel for the State.
2. The Petitioners are seeking pre-arrest bail in connection with G.R. Case No.654 of 2021 pending in the Court of learned S.D.J.M, Patnagarh, arising out of Larambha P.S. Case No.127 of 2021 for commission of offence punishable under Sections 419/420/468/471/34 IPC.
3. At the outset, it is submitted by the learned counsel, Mr. Joshi that Petitioner No.1 was before this Court in ABLAPL No.12406 of 2021 as well as in ABLAPL No.14007 of 2022 and Petitioner No.2 moved this Court in ABLAPL No.13561 of 2022.
4. It is submitted by the learned counsel that in the interregnum one of the co-accused, namely Prasad



Meher was taken into custody and released on bail by the learned Court in seisin and an affidavit filed by the Informant, which is on record, indicates that the matter has been settled inter se between the parties and referring to the same, it is stated that in view of such change circumstance earlier non-entertaining the bail application of the Petitioners ought not to weigh with this Court.

5. Learned counsel for the State opposes such prayer.

6. It is trite that there is no bar for filing successive bail application and more so anticipatory bail application.

7. Taking into account the change circumstance as noted above, it is directed that on surrendering within three weeks hence and moving for bail, the Petitioners shall be released on bail by the learned Court in seisin on such terms as deemed just and proper.

8. Before releasing the learned Court shall verify as to whether this order has been assailed before the Apex Court and if so, the result thereof.

9. It is needless to state that the Petitioners shall cooperate with the ongoing investigation.

10. Accordingly, the ABLAPL stands disposed of.
