01. 1. Heard learned counsel for the Petitioners and learned counsel for the State.
2. The Petitioners are seeking pre-arrest bail in connection with G.R. Case No.1625 of 2025 pending in the Court of learned J.M.F.C.(CT), Talcher, arising out Colliery P.S. Case No.711 of 2025 for commission of offences punishable under Sections 109(1), 117(2), 118(1), 126(2) and 3(5) of BNS.
3. Learned counsel for the State opposes the prayer for pre-arrest bail.
4. Taking into account the nature of allegations, number of injuries suffered by the injured and one injury is grievous in nature, this Court is not inclined to entertain the prayer for pre-arrest bail. However, ABLAPL is disposed of with the observation that the Petitioners



may surrender before the learned J.M.F.C,(CT), Talcher in connection with the aforementioned case within one month from today.

5. In the event of their surrender and motion for bail, the application for bail shall be considered by the learned J.M.F.C,(CT), Talcher on merits in accordance with law in the first hour of the day subject to verification of antecedent. In the event of rejection of the prayer for bail by the learned J.M.F.C,(CT), Talcher, the Petitioners are at liberty to move the higher forum for bail in the second hour on the same day.

6. On being so moved, the higher forum is requested to make an endeavour to dispose of the bail application of the Petitioners on the same day on merit in accordance with law.

The case diary shall be made available to the concerned Courts to facilitate disposal of the bail application of the Petitioners and learned J.M.F.C,(CT), Talcher is called upon to transmit the case record to the higher forum in the second hour expeditiously in the event of rejection of such bail application.

7. Accordingly, the ABLAPL stands disposed of.
